About the Survey



Mode	Data was collected online (751) and on the phone (249). Online completes were sourced from a representative panel of adults statewide. Telephone interviews were conducted by trained professional interviewers calling cellphones and landlines.
Sample	1,000 Massachusetts residents
Dates	February 28-March 6, 2024
Weights	Slight weights were applied to ensure the sample accurately reflects the demographic profile of the Massachusetts population
Margin of Error	±3% at the 95% confidence level for the entire sample; the margin of error for subgroups is higher
Note	Some data may not add up to 100% due to rounding

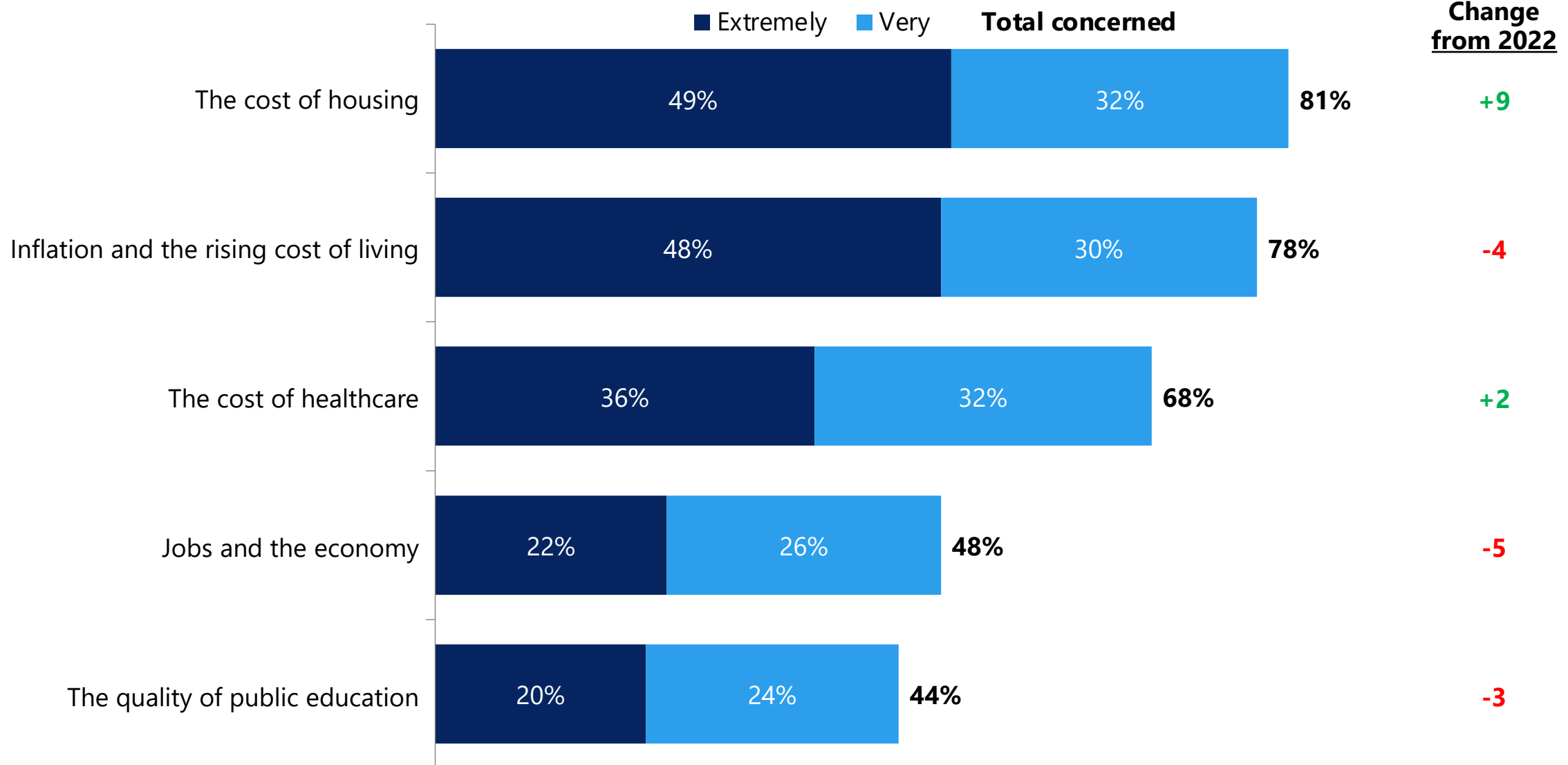

Healthcare costs are an increasing concern and burden for Massachusetts residents.

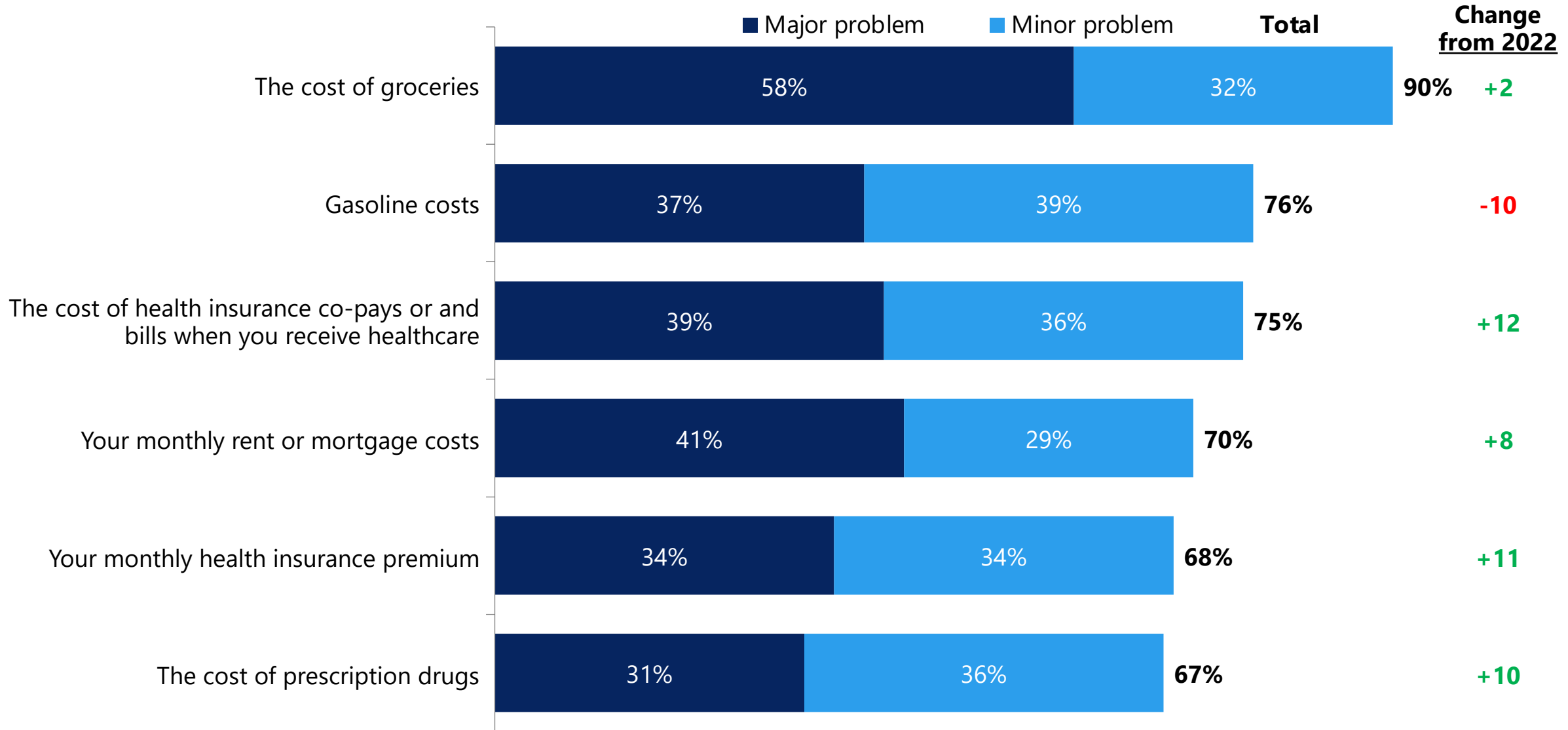


Housing costs, inflation, and the cost of healthcare are big concerns for residents.





An increasing number of families say co-pays and healthcare bills are a problem.

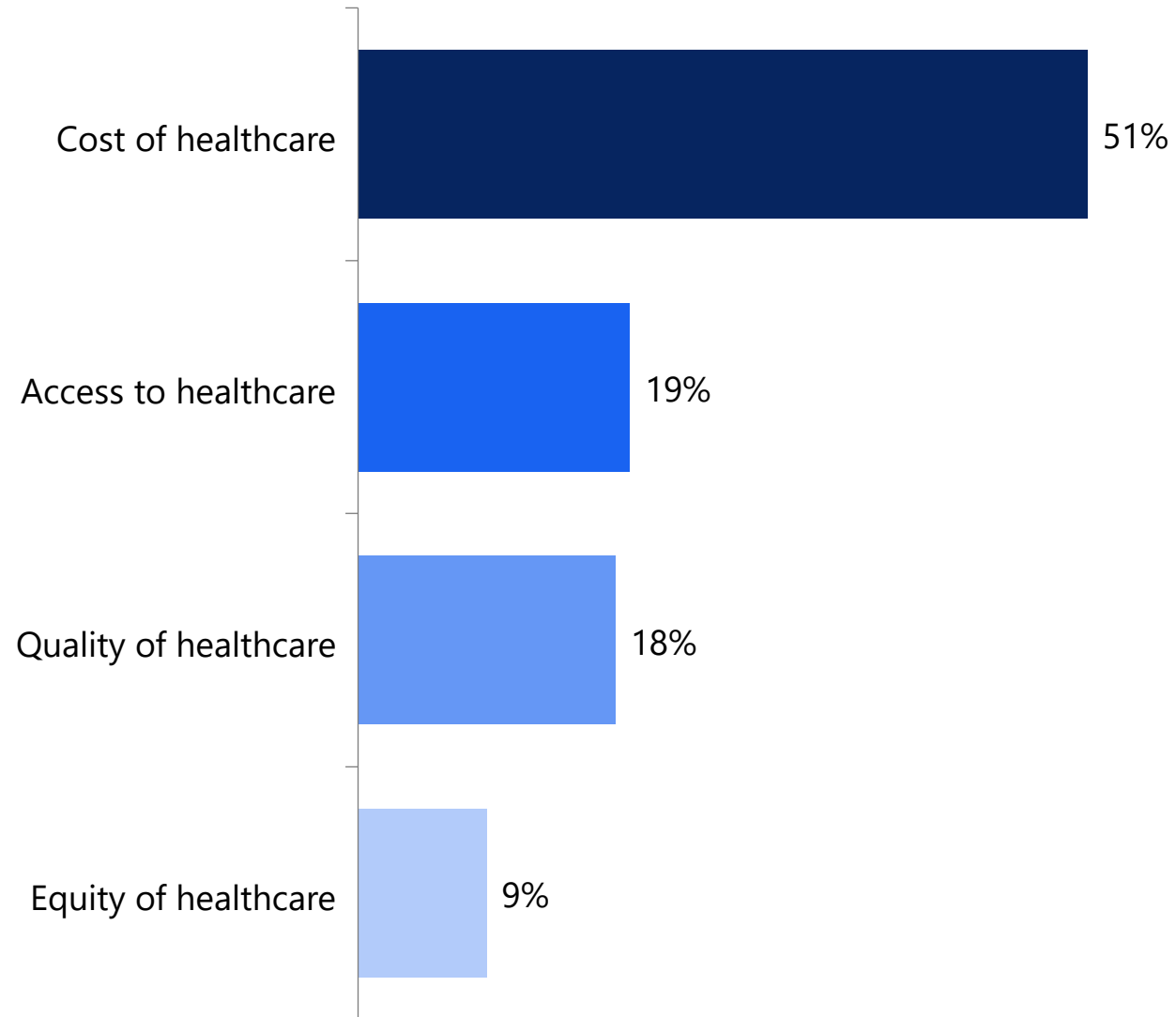




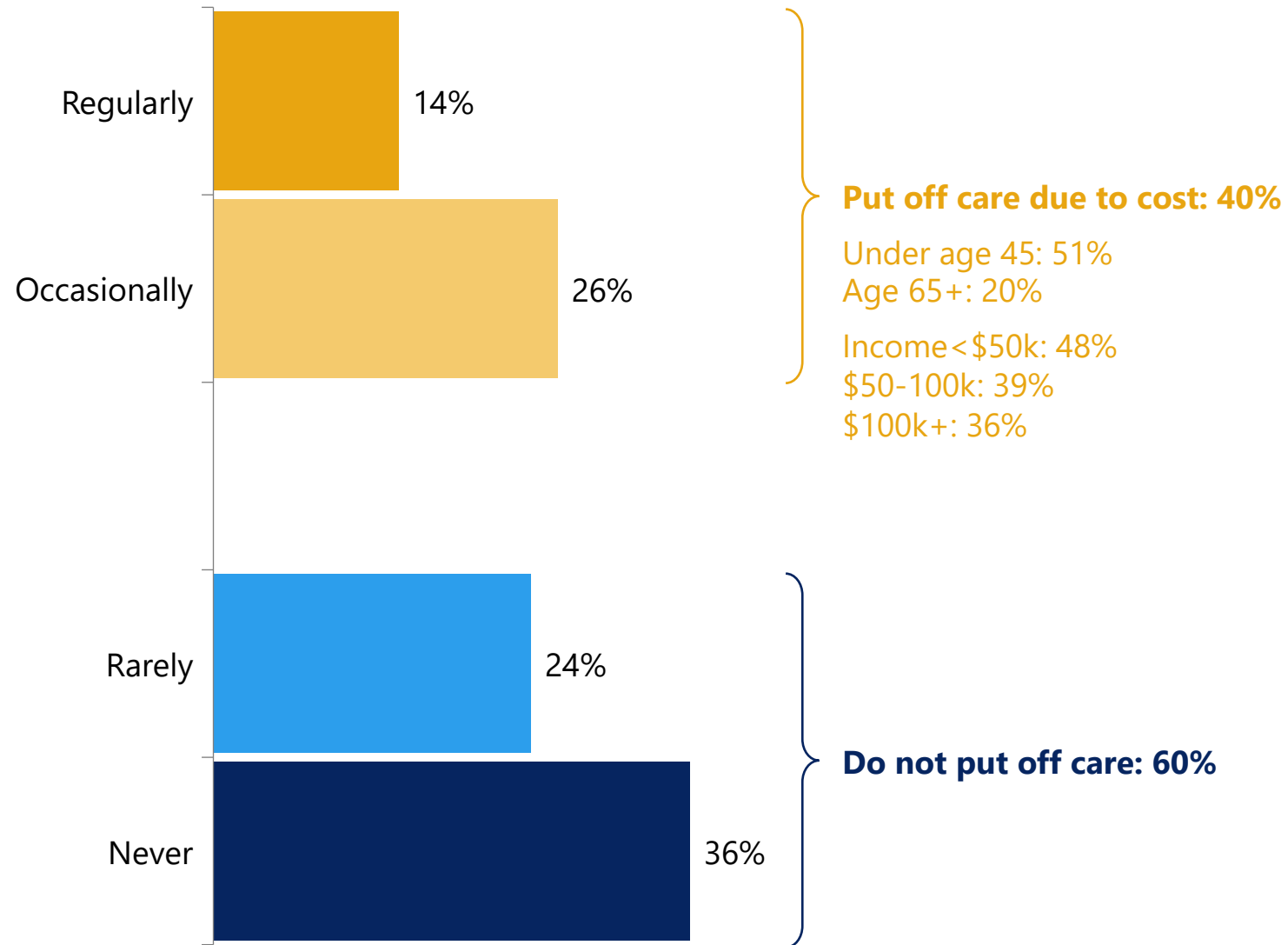
Cost is the paramount healthcare issue, with many residents delaying care due to the expense.



Cost is the top healthcare issue facing the state, by far.



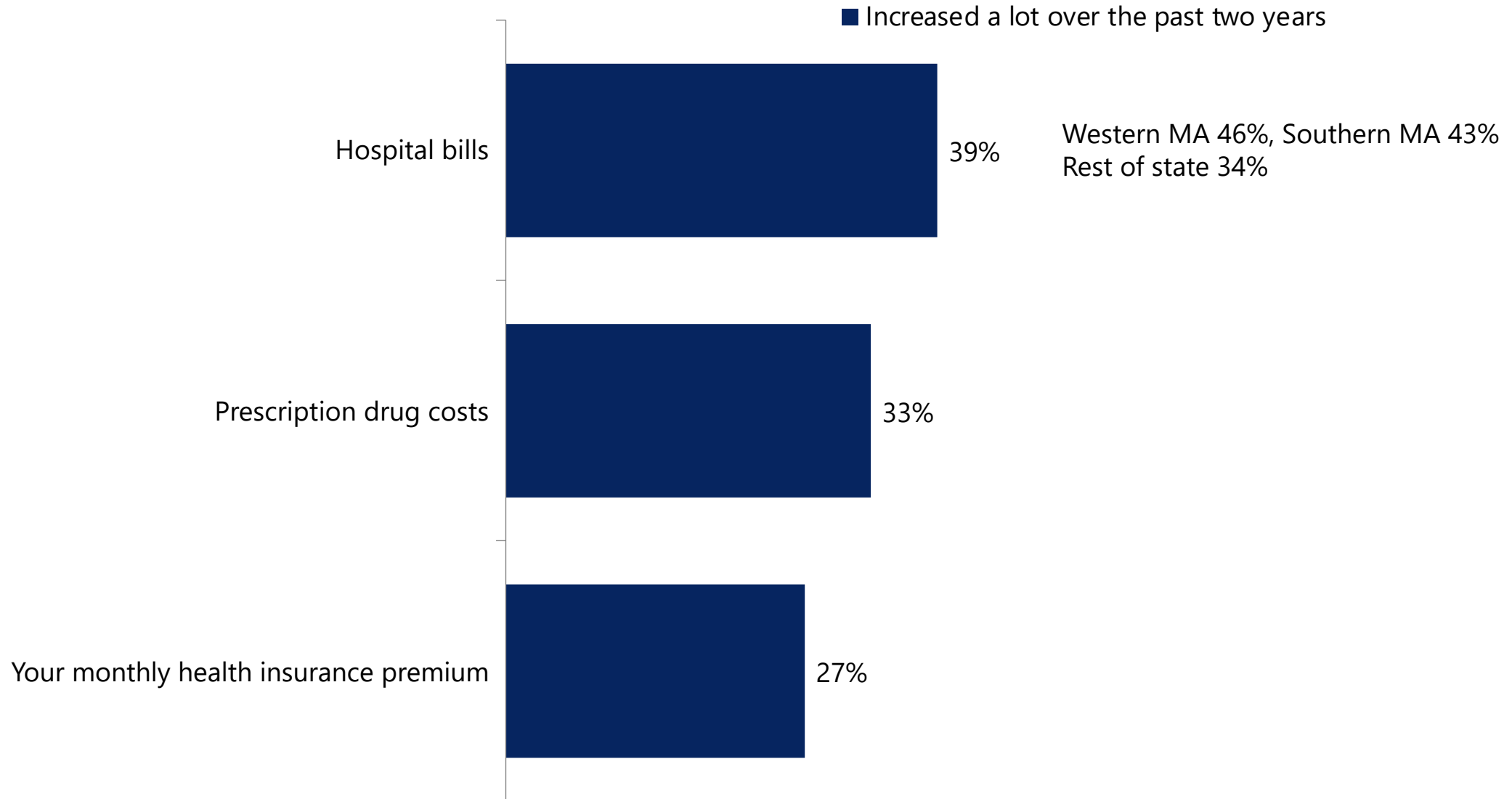
Four-in-ten put off medical care due to cost—including half of younger and less affluent residents.

Residents see increasing costs across the healthcare landscape—but particularly at hospitals.



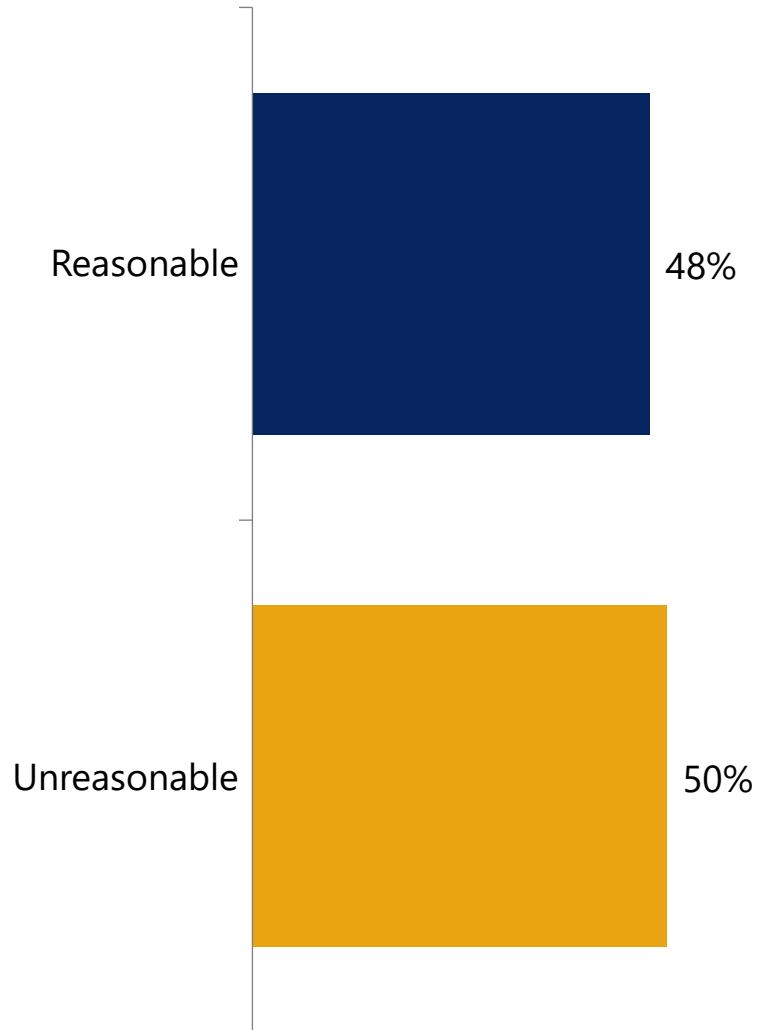


Emergency room wait times are seen as unreasonable.

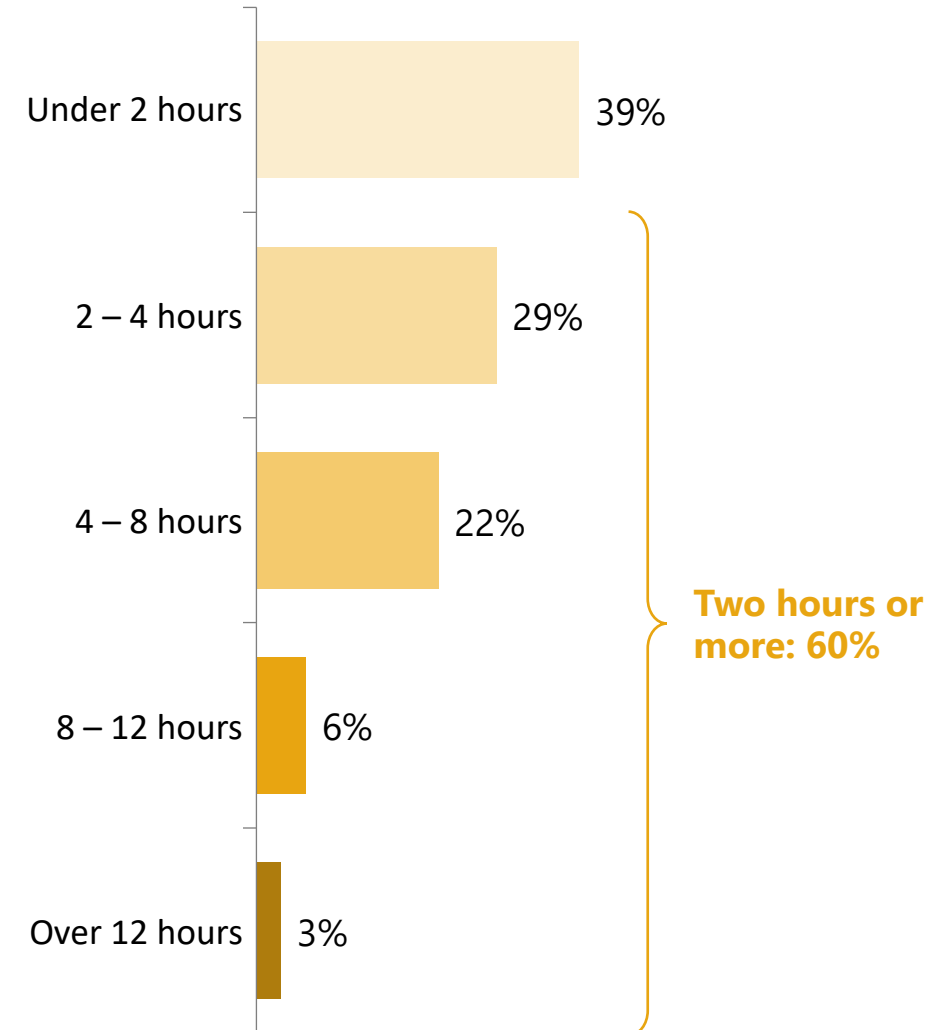


Half of those who received ER care felt the wait was unreasonable.
